Why Are Succulent Leaves Turning Yellow?

Diagnose the problem fast — and fix it even faster.

Overwatering

Roots waterlog and rot — leaves go yellow and mushy.

FIX:

Let soil dry fully. Water deeply then discard excess. Check every 2-3 weeks.

Underwatering

Leaves look wrinkled and pale yellow. Soil feels bone dry.

FIX:

Soak deeply until water drains. Let soil dry then check again in 7-14 days.

Too Much Sun

Bleached yellow/white patches. Leaves feel crispy and dry.

FIX:

Move to bright indirect light. Introduce direct sun gradually.

Low Light

Pale overall yellowing. Plant may lean or stretch toward windows.

FIX:

Place near a south-facing window or add a full-spectrum grow light.

Poor Soil / Pot

Waterlogged soil suffocates roots. Leaves drop and yellow at base.

FIX:

Use fast-draining succulent mix. Always choose pots with drain holes.

Pests

Yellow spots or sticky residue. Look for mealybugs or spider mites.

FIX:

Treat with 70% isopropyl alcohol or diluted neem oil spray.

Cold Stress

Yellow patches after cold nights. Leaves may look translucent.

FIX:

Keep above 50F (10C). Move away from cold drafts and winter windows.

GOLDEN RULE: When in doubt — wait it out. Succulents always prefer less water over more!

Fixing a Leggy Succulent

Etiolation = your plant reaching for light. Step-by-step fix:

STEP 1 Move to Bright Light

Gradually increase exposure.
Target: 6+ hours bright indirect sun.

STEP 2 Behead the Stretched Stem

Cut cleanly just below rosette.
Let the cut end dry 2-3 days.

STEP 3 Replant the Cutting

Place in fresh succulent mix.
Water lightly after 1 week.

STEP 4 Let the Base Regrow

Remaining stem sprouts babies
in 2-4 weeks — be patient!

STEP 5 Use a Grow Light Indoors

Full-spectrum LED, 14-16 hrs/day.
Keep 6-8 inches above plant.

PRO TIP: Rotate pot 1/4 turn weekly for even, compact growth!

Revive Your Snake Plant

Dracaena trifasciata — Common Problems & How to Fix Them

Yellow & Mushy Leaves

CAUSE: Overwatering or root rot.

Remove from pot, trim rotten roots, let dry 2-3 days. Replant in fresh fast-draining mix. Water just once every 3-4 weeks.

Brown Leaf Tips

CAUSE: Low humidity, fluoride in tap water, or fertiliser burn.

Switch to filtered water. Keep humidity above 30%. Flush soil thoroughly to clear salt buildup.

Curling Leaves

CAUSE: Underwatering, thrip pests, or cold drafts.

Water deeply when top 2 inches of soil is dry. Inspect for insects. Move away from air vents or cold windows.

Drooping / Falling Over

CAUSE: Root rot from overwatering, or pot is too small.

Check roots — trim any that are brown and mushy. Repot if root-bound. Stake leaves temporarily while recovering.

Pale / Washed-Out Color

CAUSE: Too much direct sun (sunscauld) or nutrient deficiency.

Move to bright indirect light. Feed with diluted balanced liquid fertiliser once in spring only.

No New Growth

CAUSE: Winter dormancy, wrong pot size, or depleted soil.

Normal in winter — do not overwater. Repot in spring with fresh mix. Refresh soil every 2-3 years.

Sansevieria 'Samurai'

Sansevieria ehrenbergii 'Samurai' | Dwarf Snake Plant

Common Names	Dwarf Snake Plant, Sword Sansevieria
Origin	Africa
Plant Type	Perennial Succulent
Height	4 to 6 inches
Sun	Direct or Indirect bright light
Soil	Loamy / Sandy, fast-draining
Temperature	60F - 75F (15C - 23C)
Watering	Only when soil is completely dry
Toxicity	Non-Toxic
USDA Zones	9 - 11
Difficulty	Very Easy (beginner-friendly)

Why Grow Samurai?

The Sansevieria Samurai is a compact, striking variety with short, thick, bluish-green leaves arranged in a fan-like rosette. It is one of the toughest houseplants you can own — nearly impossible to kill if you follow the basic rules of succulent care. Perfect for desks, shelves, or any low-maintenance spot in your home.

- Compact 4-6" rosette, great for small spaces
- Extremely drought-tolerant
- Thrives in low to bright indirect light
- Air-purifying properties
- Safe around pets and children

Care Tips at a Glance

Light

4-6 hrs bright indirect light. Some morning sun is fine. Avoid harsh midday sun.

Water

Water every 2-4 weeks. Always check soil is fully dry first. Less in winter.

Soil

Cactus/succulent mix. Or DIY: 2 parts sand + 1 part perlite + 1 part potting soil.

Temp

Keep above 50F. Avoid cold windows in winter. No sudden temperature swings.

Repot

Every 2-3 years or when roots show at drain holes. Best done in spring.

Feeding

Feed once in spring with diluted balanced fertiliser. Never fertilise in winter.

Watering Cheatsheet

Season-by-season guide for perfectly watered succulents

SPRING

Growing Season

Active growth begins. Water every 7-10 days. Increase frequency gradually as temps warm. Always check soil 2 inches deep before watering.

SUMMER

Peak Growing

Hottest and driest period. Outdoor plants: every 5-7 days. Indoor plants: every 10-14 days. Watch for heat stress and wilting.

AUTUMN

Slow Down

Growth slows as temperatures drop. Reduce to every 14-21 days. Let soil dry completely between waterings. Stop fertilising.

WINTER

Dormancy

Most succulents are dormant. Water just once every 3-6 weeks. Always err on the side of less. Cold + wet = root rot.

THE FINGER TEST — Always Works

Push your finger 2 inches into the soil, then:

DRY = water now

DAMP = wait 2 more days

WET = wait a full week

DO THIS

- Water deeply until it fully drains
- Use room-temperature water
- Let soil dry completely between sessions
- Water in the morning

NOT THIS

- Mist the leaves
- Water on a fixed schedule
- Use saucers that trap water
- Water in cold evenings
